One delightful task recently was to serve as the venue for the presentation of the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service to the Surrey Hills Society by HRH the Earl of Wessex, which vou can read about on the opposite page, along with the final report on page 6 of 'One Enchanted Evening' which raised thousands of pounds towards the restoration of the Drummond Chapel.

Aside from these high profile events, the church is a destination for several thousands of visitors every year, and as a place for meaningful events on a much more personal scale. It continues to see marriages blessed and celebrations marked, and it was great to be with Lucy and Joss tying the knot in September.

Alongside trying to raise funds for the restoration of Phase Two of the Drummond Chapel restoration/ conservation, we are in regular contact with the CCT about larger and smaller issues within church. One thing of particular concern to us at the moment is the apparent damp problem at the foot of some of the walls. We believe this can be rectified with comparatively minor improvement to the water run-off and drainage arrangements outside, and we will keep up the dialogue with them.

So, thank you for all that you do to support this living piece of history, and we look forward to seeing you at any of the events on the back page, or simply to visit the old church. Don't forget the Carol Service on 22 December – a simple local celebration whose unique feel and character has spread a reputation far and wide.



The Royal Visit - HRH Prince Edward

With Albury sitting in the midst of the Surrey Hills, the Friends have always had a good relationship with the **Surrey Hills AONB**.

The *Surrey Hills Society*, formed in 2008, is in effect the public face of the **A**rea of **O**utstanding **N**atural **B**eauty and this year they have been honoured with the **Queens Award for Voluntary Service** (QAVS)!

On Wednesday, 6 November the Award was presented by HRH Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex at the Saxon Church in Albury Park. Whilst the event



was not directly ours, it afforded the opportunity to gain a good deal of publicity and to be an integral part of the Tillingbourne Valley and the SHS.

On the arrival of the royal party, Prince Edward was introduced to Gordon Jackson (Surrey Hills Society Chairman) and to Andrew (Friends Chairman) by Michael More-Molyneux (Lord-Lieutenant for Surrey).

After inspecting all of the many and varied displays of the SHS Volunteers, the Friends Group had the opportunity to talk about our plans for the restoration/conservation of the Drummond Chapel. The Prince expressed a keen interest and wished us luck with our endeavours!





At the end of the speeches and the formal presentation of the QAVS Award, Prince Edward signed the Friends Visitors Book along with 47 volunteer members of the

Surrey Hills Society. All-in-all a highly successful and satisfying event that was enjoyed by everyone.

Fortunately, after so much rain, the day was beautifully bright and sunny. Albury Park looked absolutely splendid with its burnished autumn



colours. However, this was evenly matched by the floral display inside the Church! Our team of flower ladies surpassed themselves with their artistic skills, so our sincere thanks to Shirley Farrar, Jackie Squance, Sally Godfrey, Julie Baxter and Janet Brown.





Fund-Raising is still alive and well!

Our Fund-raising is nearly complete for this calendar year, but it must be reported that we are, with your help, doing extremely well! At the moment we have more than £35.000 reserved for Phase Two of the restoration/ conservation of the Drummond Chapel.

This year we have almost added £10,000 to this good cause with the fantastic support from the local community for the various events that the Friends have managed to put on, and we sincerely thank everyone who has helped to contribute towards this.



With our reserved finances in a good position, it is our intention to apply for Match-Funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund early next year.

Certainly a good constant source of funding comes from Friends becoming Life Members or Joint Life Members. At the moment we have 62 Life and Joint Life Members together with 25 Benefactors.

Celebrating 50 Years of the CCT

This year The Churches Conservation Trust celebrates fifty years of history. Originally it was established in 1969 as the *Redundant Churches Fund*, a unique partnership of church, state and charity, which was the result of tireless campaigning by a pioneering group of heritage enthusiasts.

The CCT operates the third largest heritage estate in charitable ownership in the UK. All 353 of the churches in their collection are listed, mostly Grade I and II with some being scheduled ancient monuments (our particular Saxon Church is a Grade I listed building). Collectively the churches in the CCT's portfolio attract more than two million visitors each year. This unique collection includes irreplaceable examples of architecture, archaeology and art from more than a thousand years of history.

All of these historic churches are vested in the CCT by the *Church Commissioners of the Church of England* and set out to be the caretakers, repairing the damage from sometimes years of neglect, and working with local communities to bring them back to life again. Their vision is for historic churches to be enjoyed by everyone as places of heritage, culture, spirituality and beauty and for the significant contribution they make to communities, society and the economy.

The Albury Old Saxon Church was vested to the CCT in 1974 and the Friends Group of local volunteers have been closely associated with the CCT ever since then.
